1. How many generations are recorded in this chapter including Adam and Noah? _____
 2. How old was Adam when his grandson Enos was born? _____
 3. Who lived the longest in this chapter and died in the year of the flood? _____ His age? _____
 4. Who in this chapter did not die? _____ What happened to him (compare Heb 11:5)? _____
 5. Who in this chapter prophesied against ungodly sinners (compare Jude 14)? _____
 6. What did Lamech say about his son Noah when he was born? _____
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Extra: Was Enoch alive when Adam died? _____

THINGS TO THINK ABOUT:

How do you want to be remembered after you die? Do you want to be remembered as having lived so many years, had so many children, grandchildren, etc, or do you want people to remember that you “walked with God?” (vs 22, 24)

What is involved in “walking with God?” Enoch “walked with God” in an ungodly generation. Can a child of God “walk with God” in today's ungodly world?

Are you “walking with God?” What do you need to do to truly “walk with God?” Make that commitment and change whatever is necessary and seek immediately to “walk with God!”

HELP:

1. 10 generations.
 2. Add Adam's age at Seth's birth (130), plus Seth's age at Enos' birth (105) = 235 years, Adam's age when his grandson Enos was born.
 3. Methuselah. 969 years old.
 4. Enoch. He was “translated that he should not see death.”
 5. Enoch.
 6. “This same shall comfort us concerning our work and toil of our hands, because of the ground which the LORD hath cursed.”
- Extra: Yes. Add the number of years of each of the 6 fathers, at the birth of their son, who preceded Enoch (130, 105, 90, 70, 65, 162 = 622, plus Enoch's age of 365 to = 987. Since Adam lived to be 930 years old, Enoch was living when Adam died. Enoch was a contemporary with Adam for 308 years.
