THINGS TO THINK ABOUT:

Do you realize that it is by the pure grace of God alone that you understand any of the truth that our Lord Jesus taught. God gives this understanding to those whom he chooses. And, as this chapter tells us, God chooses to reveal these things to babes most often while blinding the eyes and ears of the wise and prudent. From beginning to end, God gets all the glory and praise!

Would you stop to help some stranger that appeared to be in sincere need? Would you stop to help if that person were for some reason very different from you? Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan points out that we ought to help those in need that the LORD puts in our daily walk even if that person is not very attractive or likable. After caring for our families and the churches of Jesus Christ, let us be willing and attentive to opportunities to show mercy to someone in need in Jesus Name.

HELP:

1. Other seventy also (v 1).

2. The disciples should rather rejoice that their names were written in heaven (v 20).

3. Many prophets and kings that were before the time of Christ (v 24).

4. "But he, willing to justify himself, said unto Jesus, And who is my neighbor?" (v 29).

5. Mary chose the good part of sitting at the feet of Jesus and hearing his word; Martha chose to be cumbered with serving a meal (vv 39-42).
